Spring Lake District Library opened at 9:30 a.m. on Monday, September 24, and by 9:37 a.m. library patron Nancy Meekhof was already heading out the door with an iPad in hand. Nancy had the honor of being the first patron to take advantage of the new option to borrow an iPad from the library. She came prepared with her library card and photo ID, and was eager to have the opportunity to try an

iPad to see if she liked it well enough to purchase one in the future.

Spring Lake District Library Director Claire Sheridan predicts the iPads will be a popular library resource. The library was already loaning Sony e-readers, Nooks and Kindles with great success. The iPads are even more versatile, as they have numerous apps, websites, and e-books already loaded on them. The devices were purchased through funds provided by the Spring Lake District Library Endowment Fund at the Grand Haven Area Community Foundation.

Spring Lake Public Schools introduced iPads to their K - 4th grade students this year and the library has worked with the school to support the initiative. The library and school coordinated their efforts to ensure both were using many of the same educational apps on their iPads. Library classes designed for parents of students who received the devices were scheduled in September. Parents were shown how to use the iPads as well as how to download additional educational apps and e-books.

In addition to the tutorials always available at the Morningstar Investment Research Center, there are special monthly training webinars offered on the first Thursday of each month at 11:00 a.m. Central Time. Patrons can access Morningstar and these special training webinars at the library or log-in remotely using their Spring Lake District Library card.

Against the Odds: Making a Difference in Global Health

Spring Lake District Library will be hosting the traveling exhibition "Against the Odds: Making a Difference in Global Health" from October 22 through December 1, 2012. This exhibition is traveling to libraries and universities across the nation courtesy of The National Library of Medicine and the National Institutes of Health. The exhibit highlights the role of communities in improving health at home and around the world. The basic shared needs of nutritious food and clean water, a safe place to live, and affordable health care are the central themes of the exhibit.



The exhibit incorporates historical and contemporary photos to tell the stories of individuals and groups who have taken up the challenges to prevent disease and improve medical care. The work of the Bangladesh Rural Advancement Committee that teaches mothers about Oral Rehydration Therapy and the Landless Workers' Movement that empowers poor citizens in Brazil to begin subsistence farming are two of the stories included in the exhibit.

Spring Lake District Library will be hosting a special presentation in conjunction with the exhibit entitled *Water for* Haiti on Thursday, Nov. 15, at 7 p.m. Guest speakers Dr. Peter Wampler, Dr. Rick Rediske, and Dr. Azizur Molla of Grand Valley State University will talk about their interdisciplinary research project to improve the quality of drinking water for Haitians. The three professors combined their fields of expertise: geology, water resources, and anthropology, to tackle the issue of poor water quality in rural Haiti. The public is invited to attend this free presentation and learn more about the project.
